George Washington Carver was a **Treasure** to everyone he met, and our newspapers reported on what he was doing and where he was going throughout his life.

Southeast Off Square

Unable to **Savor** The Rise as an artist, Carver studied agriculture and dedicated his life to helping farmers.

He had strong **Roots** and followed his dreams despite the difficulties he faced.

South Side of Square

Carver was a **Pageturner**, reading as many books as he could. Getting an education was important but difficult.

Carver had a great spirit and **Soulful** Heart. He took walks in the woods almost every day to find ideas and inspiration

West Side of Square

Carver had many **Creations** and found ways to use plants others that others considered to be a weed. He said, "A weed is just a plant in the wrong location"

Carver wanted to **Feed and Foster** poor farmers, and his Jessup Wagon was a traveling classroom for teaching farmers.

He was skilled in knitting and **Stitchery**, mending his clothes, which he wore until they were tattered and threadbare.

Inside the **Corner Sundry**, find the 1890 photo when the Square was "wired" for electricity. Carver was here when they threw the switch for the new electric lights.

Southwest Off Square

Carver felt a **Connection** with everything in nature and always had a fresh flower in the buttonhole of his jacket. Inside find sculptures created by Indianola Middle School students depicting the life of the Professor.

Carver lived and ran a laundry business inside a **Little Shed**. He worked hard and shopped on the Square for everything he needed.

North Side of Square

Carver studied botany and understood the value and importance of all living things. Dissect and pollinate flowers at **Ouderkirk Law Firm**; hosted by ICSD Elementary science classrooms.

Northeast Off Square

Step inside McCoy'sHardware for a display from the Carver Museum and then plant seeds. Hosted by the Warren County Historical Society & Museum.
