Matthew Simpson Lecture Endowment Fund

In 2013, gifts from two college employees established the Matthew Simpson Lecture Endowment Fund to help ensure the ongoing quality of the annual lecture and related events. In 2016 the Fund had grown to approximately \$10,900. In February 2017, a gift of approximately \$50,000 boosted the fund significantly.

In addition, Dr. Bruce and Bette Haddox have donated \$100,000 to support the Matthew Simpson Lecture.

This gift, along with continuing contributions from other friends of the college, ensures the lecture and programming into the future.

Professors Roger Betsworth and Bruce Haddox, members of the department of religion and philosophy, founded the Matthew Simpson Lecture in 1980. With the assistance of the dean for academic affairs, Mel Henderson, who granted the lecture program a \$500 operating budget, the two founders were able to invite their first speaker, Dr. Stanley Hauerwas. Dr. Hauerwas' talk was titled "A Tale of Two Stories," an exploration of "being a Christian and a Texan." In 2013, several gifts inaugurated the Matthew Simpson Lecture Endowment Fund to help ensure the ongoing quality of the annual lecture and related events.

The original goal of the lectureship was to expose Simpson students to the leading thinkers in religion, biblical studies and social ethics. Past speakers have included provocative thinkers such as the Reverend Will Campbell, a Southern Baptist preacher and a longtime civil rights leader; John Dominic Crossan, the leading scholar in the Jesus Seminar and expert on the New Testament; the internationally acclaimed theologian Martin Marty; and Amy-Jill Levine, the leading Jewish New Testament Scholar.

REV. DR. RANDALL BALMER

A prize-winning historian of American religion, an Emmy Award nominee, and an Episcopalian priest, Randall Balmer is the John Phillips Chair in Religion at Dartmouth College.

An alumnus of Hoover High School in Des Moines, he earned his Ph.D. from Princeton University in 1985 and has taught at the nation's top colleges and universities, including Columbia, Northwestern, Princeton and Yale.

The Reverend Doctor Balmer has written more than a dozen books, including *Bad Faith: Race and the Rise of the*

Religious Right (2021), *Evangelicalism in America* (2016), *Redeemer: The Life of Jimmy Carter* (2014), and *God in the White House: How Faith Shaped the Presidency from John F. Kennedy to George W. Bush* (2008).

His second book, *Mine Eyes Have Seen the Glory: A Journey into the Evangelical Subculture in America*, now in its fifth edition, was made into an award-winning, three-part documentary for PBS.
